

A TOTAL of RM100,000 was raised to buy medical supplies for public hospitals handling Covid-19 cases in the Klang Valley.

Among the items supplied include high carts with oxygen tanks, personal protective equipment, surgical face masks, face shields, whiteboards, blood glucose monitoring machines, disinfectant spray guns, medical thermometers and large tents.

Due to restrictions imposed on medical supplies as a result of the Covid-19 outbreak, they are unable to operate during this time.

This resulted in a shortage of such equipment at government hospitals in Klang Valley.

As such, the Cross Relief Squad of MCA (CRSM) stepped in to launch an emergency fundraising exercise through GoCare and received encouraging response from the public.

With the funds raised, GoCare transferred the large consignment of goods to Hospital Putrajaya and Hospital Klang.

It also delivered medical items to ministers in Hospital Serdang.

The group sent medical supplies, logistical lunch and chocolate biscuits to frontliners at Hospital Serdang too.

AST Chemical Group donated 100 disinfectant guns and disinfectants, IC Science Biotechnology Association donated a sweepnet digital camera and amplifier as well as sponsored vegetable lunch boxes.

Nova Media Company donated a blood glucose meter and test handle while the large consignment of goods was received by VTAH frontiers.

These hospitals need disinfectant guns so that every department can be disinfected easily.

They also require blood glucose meters to expedite the classification of patients at high risk of Covid-19.

Wanita MCA chair Datin Liang Suk said GoCare was also collaborating with Wanita MCA to raise funds to buy medical equipment for pregnant women and newborn babies infected with Covid-19.

"To reduce the risk of cross-infection, each respondent mother and newborn baby require a separate isolation room, medical supplies and equipment.

"However, these hospitals also urgently need new sets of powered air purifying respirators, seven units of digital scale for fat and below, and two units of digital electronic infant weighing scale," she added.

CRSM national chair Datin Nuzula Lina Chang Li said the group and GoCare would continue to raise funds to buy emergency hospitals in the Klang Valley and also would be provided in the coming days.

She said the club also welcomed donations from individuals that were interested in making a contribution to frontliners.

The donations made by the club were received by the hospital's emergency and critical care consultant Dr Aidi Osman.

Separately, Royal Ipoh Club provided first aid to about 80 residents from the club group who were impacted by the pandemic.

Club president Datin Dr S. Sivanesan said the contribution was part of the Covid-19 assistance corporate social responsibility programme and was held in two occasions.

Disabled and infirm get Covid-19 jobs at home

SOME 30 disabled and infirm in the Klang Valley are being trained on their Covid-19 vaccination, thanks to their employment and the shared health office.

An new work-based initiative will be used to vaccinate workers in the Klang Valley.

The jobs were administered to those in the comfort of their own homes.

Special assistance from Lai said that he received support requests for help from caregivers and relatives that their loved ones were missing out on being protected against the virus.

"Many of the patients were not physically able to get to a PV and it would be too expensive for their families to have an ambulance."
